
John Olsen Scholarship for Aircraft Maintenance Technicians

Snowflakes Fly Past in Honour of Bruce Aikenhead September 22nd

The Flying Club received the following email sent to the attention of Stu McLean:

Once again I must thank you and the Formation Flying Team for a very touching flypast for Dad, Bruce Alexander Aikenhead. Guests and people who heard about it remarked that it gave them "emotional shivers" and commented "I think I'm going to cry." All understood what an honour it was!

By now the VFC will have received a cheque for \$400 made out to the VFC Formation Flying Team and the VFC. Dad often spoke to children at school so I think he would like to encourage kids to become involved in aviation. His interest in aviation began when he was almost six when he saw the Graf Zeppelin over Detroit and Windsor, ON. As a kid Dad collected and made model planes which hovered from the ceiling of his bedroom. As a child in London, Ontario, he was a member of a children's aviation club, 'The Birdmen of America'.

At sixteen he would ride his bike miles away to the nearest airport runway to watch biplanes take off and land. He'd had the aviation bug since he was 5 years old, so that would be an interest for 90 years!

Bruce Aikenhead, an Officer of the Order of Canada, who worked for 40 years in the aerospace field, has passed away Monday at the age of 95.



Canadian astronaut Robert Thirsk said "the first group of CSA astronauts did not have a deep background in aerospace. But our program manager did. Bruce Aikenhead became our go-to guy for information. To say thank you, I sent a photo of Shuswap Lake from ISS to Bruce. Bruce passed away yesterday. He will be missed."

According to his biography at the Canadian Virtual Museum "Bruce Aikenhead is one of the pioneers of the Canadian aerospace industry with over 40 years' experience in aerospace engineering and astronaut training development. Aikenheads's career as a systems engineer led him to work on illustrious projects such as the Avro Arrow, NASA's Project Mercury, and

the Canadarm for NASA's Space Shuttle program. Additionally, he served as a project engineer for RCA's ISIS-2 Ionosphere Research Satellite, 'Hermes' Communications Technology Satellite and the High Altitude Research Project (HARP) at McGill University. Aikenhead was integral in the development of the Canadian Astronaut Program, where he served as Director-General. Aikenhead was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada for his contributions to Canada's space program."

The CBC's Bob McDonald, host of Quirks & Quarks, paid tribute to Aikenhead when he turned 90.

He said "you probably recognize the astronaut on the (right) in the photograph below, but Chris Hadfield owes his career in space to the gentleman on the left, Bruce Aikenhead, who hired Chris and the other Canadian astronauts and who was a pioneering founder of the Canadian space program."

"Bruce, who just celebrated his 90th birthday, is one of those behind-the-scenes engineers you seldom see, but without whom major projects would not get off the ground. 
